LEGO EXPERIENCE

Our Upper Key Stage 2 children were offered the chance to take part in an engaging STEM learning experience with Yorkshire Water.

The session was based on the theme of sewer blockages and flooding and involved the children using coding and robotics design to complete a real-world challenge using Lego.

The children were so engaged throughout the day and it sparked conversations about future careers in the STEM industry.

CHRISTMAS TREE LIGHT SWITCH ON

Although many of our pupils do not personally celebrate Christmas due to their own religious beliefs and cultural traditions, we continue to mark this time of year in school as part of our RE curriculum and our commitment to teaching British values. This includes learning about different festivals, understanding their significance, and recognising the traditions that are part of our wider community.

As part of this, our Reception children were delighted to help decorate the Christmas tree in the hall. They did a wonderful job and were thrilled to enjoy a magical light switch on moment together.

Our Key Stage 1 pupils then took part in a special assembly led by our RE Leader, Mrs Umarji, where they learned about Advent and the Christmas story. Their assembly also concluded with a light switch on, creating a warm and memorable atmosphere that the children really enjoyed.

Decorating the tree and sharing a light switch on has been a treasured tradition at Diamond Wood for many years, and we are pleased to continue offering these moments of reflection, learning, and community for our pupils.

NURSERY OWL VISIT

Our Nursery pupils were thrilled to welcome the owls into school this half term. A unique experience they wouldn't usually have the chance to enjoy. This much loved annual visit not only sparks excitement but also deepens the children's understanding of the natural world, linking beautifully with their current key text Owl Babies.

The children were captivated as they observed the owls up close, and many were confident enough to hold them safely. They learned new vocabulary, including the word talons, and have already begun weaving this language into their play and storytelling.

The visit also tied in perfectly with the start of the RSPB's Big School Birdwatch, an event our children look forward to each year. Mrs Price even overheard two Nursery pupils, completely unprompted, chatting about the birds they had spotted on their way to school and proudly identifying them using the images from the RSPB posters. Moments like these show just how powerful hands on learning can be.

It was a truly memorable experience and a wonderful way to launch this year's birdwatching activities.



CORRIDOR MONITORS & PUPIL LEADERSHIP

As part of promoting democracy and developing early careers skills, our newly appointed Year 2 Corridor Monitors have joined the Pupil Leadership Team.

After being nominated and recruited, they now 'work' each lunchtime to model and promote our expectations, encouraging children to walk safely on the left and move calmly through school.

Monitors award Corridor Stars to peers who show they are sensible and safe. The class with the most stars each week wins the Star Trophy, with a record of 99 stars so far! The monitors can also earn a 'wage' of 20 Dojos per half term for their work, which they can save or spend in the Dojo Shop.

We are very proud of the excellent example they are setting.

ASTHMA FRIENDLY SCHOOLS INITIATIVE LAUNCHED

We’re proud to share that all staff have completed Asthma Awareness training last month, helping us achieve Asthma Friendly accredited status. This important initiative is designed to improve care for pupils with asthma and raise awareness of this common long-term condition.

To earn this accreditation, our school, led by the lovely Barnsley Hospital NHS team has committed to:

- Training all staff in Asthma Awareness
- Implementing an Asthma Policy and maintaining an Asthma Register
- Ensuring consistent inhaler storage across the school
- Creating a system to track inhaler expiry dates
- Keeping a spare emergency inhaler and spacer on site
- Establishing clear escalation procedures for individual cases

This is another step forward in making sure our pupils with asthma feel safe, supported, and ready to thrive during their time at Dodworth. Thank you to our dedicated staff team for making this happen!

Class 3 had a brilliant start to their new Design and Technology topic with an inspiring visit to Coxley Woods. The children ventured along the woodland paths to study the different ways a stream can be crossed, observing everything from simple natural crossings to more structured man-made solutions.

They spent time sketching, comparing and discussing the various bridge types they discovered, thinking carefully about how each design works and why certain structures are more effective. Pupils showed great enthusiasm as they examined balance, stability and the choice of materials, all of which will feed into their own bridge-building projects back in the classroom.



FOREST SCHOOL ADVENTURES & FIRE SAFETY SKILLS

Our youngest learners in EYFS had an absolutely fantastic time in Forest School this term where they experienced the simple joy of making toast over an open fire. The excitement and wonder on their faces as they watched their bread turn golden brown was a beautiful reminder of how powerful outdoor learning can be.

Meanwhile, our Year 6 pupils demonstrated remarkable maturity and responsibility during their fire safety assessment. Starting and managing a fire safely requires knowledge, careful planning, and excellent risk management skills – all qualities that our oldest pupils displayed in abundance. They thoroughly enjoyed the practical challenge, and it's been wonderful to see them develop these important life skills.

CLASS 2 EMBARK ON EGYPTIAN ADVENTURE

Our Class 2 pupils have made a brilliant start to their Design Technology unit exploring Egyptian Colours. The children have been learning two fundamental embroidery techniques: the running stitch and the cross stitch. Threading a needle for the first time can be quite a challenge, but every single child rose to the occasion magnificently.

What impressed me most was how the children supported one another, offering encouragement and celebrating each other's successes. Well done, Class 2 – your Egyptian-inspired creations are going to be spectacular!

EXCITING DEVELOPMENTS IN OUR COMPUTING CURRICULUM

We are excited to share the great progress students are making with our new computing curriculum, which focuses on creativity, coding and online collaboration.

Year 1 have created vibrant digital art using Seesaw.

Year 2 have produced their own stop-motion animations.

Year 3 are learning coding skills, including sequences, animations and conditional events.

Year 4 have designed interactive posters to promote sports clubs.

Year 5 are developing online collaboration skills, learning to think critically before posting and to evaluate online information.

Year 6 are exploring advanced coding, working with variables and object properties.



The children's enthusiasm for these new tools and projects has been inspiring. Our curriculum aims to nurture creativity, critical thinking and collaboration, preparing children for future opportunities.

We also look forward to sharing upcoming computing projects and events for families to enjoy.



CROSS COUNTRY COMPETITION

We held an internal Cross Country Competition after more than 75 pupils showed interest. From this, 45 children went on to the North Kirklees Finals, where the school achieved its best-ever results. Our Year 3 girls, Year 5 boys, and four individual runners all qualified for the next round.

At the Kirklees Finals, the children continued to perform brilliantly, and we are now awaiting news on who will progress to the West Yorkshire Finals at Temple Newsam.

To celebrate the children's hard work, outstanding participation and excellent results, the School Games organisers surprised us in Achievement Assembly with the Cross Country Participation Award. We are extremely proud of all the children for their determination, confidence and sportsmanship.

HARVEST FESTIVAL

As a school, we are raising the profile of STEM this year, and this event was a fantastic way to inspire curiosity and enthusiasm for scientific learning right from the start of the term. Pupils showed great teamwork, problem-solving skills, and a real sense of wonder as they experimented and made new discoveries.



KINDNESS MATTERS

To promote our core school value of kindness, we held a competition to design a poster as part of Kindness Week. We received an amazing 74 entries showcasing creativity, compassion, and thoughtfulness. Our Peer Wellbeing Champions carefully judged the entries and presented the winners with books as prizes.

As part of the week, pupils also took part in Compass B workshops focused on emotions, empathy, and healthy peer relationships. In addition, we celebrated World Mental Health Day by wearing yellow and taking time to reflect on ways we can prioritise our wellbeing and support one another.

FOREST SCHOOL

Year 4 have been fully embracing their Forest School sessions with Benji every Monday afternoon in the run-up to Christmas. The children have loved learning new outdoor skills, including creating their own flint tools and safely using saws to cut wood.

It has been fantastic to see so many children joining in with smiles and enthusiasm.

We discovered how a local lord, Lord John de Lacey and other barons stood up to King John, who was known for being selfish and greedy with taxes. The children learned that the Magna Carta was written in Latin and helped make laws fairer for everyone — laws that still influence our society today.

The class explored the castle grounds and learned about Ilbert de Lacy, who built the castle around 1000 years ago. They also found out how Roger de Lacy, a rich and powerful knight, passed his lands to John after his death.

A highlight of the trip was going down into the castle's dungeons, where we discovered what life was like for prisoners in the past. The children saw how dark, cold, and cramped it was — a powerful way to understand the harsh reality of medieval punishment and justice.

Everyone enjoyed a hands-on workshop about the Magna Carta, helping to bring history to life in a memorable way.



REMEMBRANCE DAY

This term, St Giles came together as a whole school community to mark Remembrance Day with dignity and respect. Our School Ambassadors represented the academy at the town's war memorial, where they joined Mrs Houchin in observing the minute's silence. Back in school, all children also paused to reflect, honouring the moment alongside their peers and demonstrating the shared values that unite our Trust schools.

Continuing an important annual tradition, our Year 6 pupils took part in a workshop with Elizabeth from the Commonwealth War Graves Commission. They visited the graveyard opposite school to learn about those laid to rest there and to pay their respects. The pupils showed impressive maturity, empathy, and understanding as they deepened their knowledge of the sacrifices made by others.
